SUNDAY OPENING. When the Rugby season kicks off, we find our Members are unable to access parking at the Shed on Saturdays so we revert to Sunday opening instead. This year, this change will be effective from **Sunday 9th May**.

MEMBERSHIP. FYI about 2 weeks before your Membership is due for renewal, we will email out a reminder to you stating

BADGES. Please remember to wear your badge. Not only does it help new Members to get to know people's names, it shows you are a paid up Member. There have been a couple of occasions recently where people have been helping themselves to Shed tools without being a Member. And if you see yellow tape on a badge, it indicates a new Member. Feel free to welcome them and introduce yourself. You may recall it can be quite daunting when you first start at The Shed not knowing where Don has found a better place for equipment ;-)

HEALTH AND SAFETY. Everyone remembers the Pike River disaster which led to an overhaul of NZ health and safety laws. With the dust created in the Shed, there is a genuine danger of dust explosions if we're not aware of how they can happen. Aside from regular vacuuming of dust, there are other steps to ensure this doesn't happen at our Shed. These include:

- Clean up after yourself including the floor and area around where you have worked
- Sharpening of tools MUST NOT be carried out on the linisher. Use the grinders in the engineering (tractor) shed instead
- Join a working bee to clean the Shed... the next one will be coming up soon

We need another Member to step up as a health and safety rep. Rod, our only current rep, has created some fabulous shadow boards as well as signage to remind Members about PPE but more needs to be done if we are to come close to meeting modern standards. Please see Nikki if this is something you are able to help with.

AGM. The Shed's AGM is coming up. We will meet in The Hub space upstairs and it will start at **2 pm on Saturday 26 June**. It was well attended last year so come early to secure a seat.
