

EQUIPMENT. We have a drum sander on its way. "A drum sander is a power tool that is generally usually used to sand flat surfaces, such as wooden floors. The cylindrical wheel (drum) has an abrasive material such as sandpaper attached to its surface, and the drum is moved at speed by an electric motor in order to sand the surface".


COMMUNITY WORK. MEMBER PROJECTS:

This is <u>Kaiwhare</u>. Made by Chris S (no he never stops working) for May Road School. It is purported to be the stingray that carried the ancestor to the Manukau Harbour and then became the guardian spirit of the Manukau Harbour. Made from scraps of Kauri and rimu. Mounted on a sheet of Plywood. Ka pai Chris.





Another one by Chris - he works in a Year 3/4 class once a week and all the headphones were in a tangled heap in the blue bucket on the floor. This saves so much time for the kids to collect. The pegs are made out of plywood after a useful suggestion by Don. Great idea!
